

2009 West Virginia Brownfields Conference – Speaker Biographies

Charlie Bartsch *Senior Fellow for Human Services & Community Development, ICF International*

Charlie has more than 25 years experience in economic and community development. He currently serves as ICF's brownfield growth expert. He is a nationally recognized authority of emerging public-private and state and federal brownfields financing and process initiatives. Prior to joining ICF in 2006, he was Director of Brownfield Studies at the Northeast-Midwest Institute, based in Washington, D.C.

Charlie was instrumental in the evolution of the brownfield issue from its inception in the early 1990s, producing the analysis of site reuse barriers and opportunities, the landmark *New Life for Old Buildings*. Over the past 20 years, he has written numerous reports that proved key to advancing brownfield revitalization, including *Brownfields "State of the States"* and the *Guide to Federal Brownfield Programs*, and *Recycling America's Gas Stations*.

Charlie often testifies before Congress on issues of economic development, most recently on HUD brownfield financing innovations and brownfield tax incentives. He is co-chair of the National Brownfield Association's Advisory Board, and national board chair of Groundwork USA. He has conducted workshops and offered training in more than 40 states, and nearly 300 communities. In 2001, he received the International Economic Development Council's 2001 Chairman's Award for Outstanding Service for his ten years of work on brownfield policies and legislation.

Peter Butler *Assistant Professor of Landscape Architecture, West Virginia University*

Peter's research interests include the interpretation, planning and recovery of derelict industrial landscapes; community design and cultural landscape history. He began working with communities in 2000 through Iowa State University Landscape Architecture Extension and has continued to the present. He facilitates, coordinates, and integrates outreach projects with his studio design course instruction through WVU's Community Design Team. Most recently, his students developed design concepts and strategies for the Everettsville (WV) Miner's Memorial Park.

George Carico *Program Coordinator, WV Brownfield Assistance Center at Marshall University*

For the past 13 years, George has held the position of Environmental Specialist at Marshall University's Center for Environmental, Geotechnical and Applied Sciences (CEGAS), concentrating on environmental management, energy management and related research and development within the business community and various government sectors. George has a B.S. degree in Geology from Marshall University (1985), and has been a Registered Professional Geologist since 1992. George has 22 years of experience in environmental consulting and remediation, including environmental site assessments, remediation design / implementation / operation, abandoned mine-land geotechnical and environmental studies, building and highway geotechnical construction, and environmental management consultation for private businesses and various government entities.

Martin Christ *Water Remediation Director, Friends of Deckers Creek*

Friends of Deckers Creek (FODC) is a non-profit organization dedicated to restoring clean water in Deckers Creek, which drains 64 square miles and discharges to the Monongahela River in Morgantown. FODC protects water, but also is concerned with pollution on land (which will get to the streams eventually) and the people who live there. FODC is carrying out a Brownfields Assessment project, and that work meshed well with their FOCUS project in Reedsville, WV. Martin's background is in water quality science.
